Our class, the 49ers, graduated almost 75 years ago. We had none of the "luxuries" of today's classes. In our dorm rooms we had no telephones or TVs. Instead, we had two telephone booths on each floor and possibly a table radio in our room. We had no washing machines or dryers. We had no kitchen facilities, such as stoves, refrigerators, or dish washers. They were not available at the time. And dorm students were not allowed to have cars. Yet, we managed happily without.

Of our entering class of 115 students, 14 class members are still alive. Some are living by themselves in their own homes. Most are living with relatives or in assisted living facilities. Some are still active both physically and mentally while others are not but all very likely remember their college days.

Our Class President, Alice **Mason** Spivey, sends her greetings to all. I thought you would like to see the photo she shared with me. Please see below. The photo shows a wood hand carved Christmas Village with fence, barn, church, house. The Village has graced the base of Alice's Christmas trees since the thirties.
