
FROM CLASSICS TO FALCONS

## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

You may have heard a lot recently about the woes of higher education: fewer students going to college in the fall due to the flawed roll-out of a new Free Application for Student Financial Aid (FAFSA), program cuts, layoffs and furloughs at colleges around the country, and sudden college closings (University of the Arts and Clarks Summit in our region most recently).

Cedar Crest is not immune to the headwinds of higher education, but through a lot of hard work, strategic investment of marketing resources, and a disciplined leadership team, we are proud to announce that enrollment is up nearly 3.5% over last year! This is a notable achievement that highlights the College's ability to evolve and grow, and that's exactly what we plan to continue as we address the budget deficit following a difficult few years.

Building on this year's growth, I've developed a strategy to boost enrollment-both through growing awareness of existing programs and launching new ones-and to increase new sources of revenue. Here's how:

We lean into our identity as a women's college. This is what makes us distinctive in the Lehigh Valley, and it's clear to me that the conventional belief that going coed would boost enrollment doesn't apply to Cedar Crest College.

We develop new programs to attract students. I've long been concerned about the absence of computer technology in our curriculum. In today's world, it's impossible to be fully educated without some level of skill and knowledge around technology and its application to our lives and careers. Thanks to an extraordinarily generous gift from the estate of Elaine and John Harmon, we are creating the Elaine and John Harmon Center for Leadership in Technology. The center will introduce three new majors: Computer Science, Data Science, and Cybersecurity. Computer Science and Data Science will offer optional concentrations in Applied Artificial Intelligence. Stay tuned for details on the center's grand opening later this year!

We will invest in marketing underenrolled programs that are in high demand fields, including our fully online majors and graduate programs. This investment includes a significant price drop for our adult undergraduate programs, to make higher education more affordable to those who may need it most.

We will invest in directly marketing to area businesses: work force development credentials, custom designed degree programs, and existing degree programs.



## Cynthia Blaschak's Impact on the Future of Cedar Crest Softball

At Cedar Crest College, we are committed to empowering women to become trailblazers who create lasting, positive change. Cynthia Blaschak '84 is a shining reflection of this mission. Her long-standing commitment to the College and other non-profit organizations, along with her dedication to uplifting women and girls, marks her as a true leader.

Cyndi's legacy at Cedar Crest began during her undergrad years as a first-generation student. She immersed herself in campus life, balancing a major in Communication with leadership roles as class president and treasurer, while also competing on the basketball and badminton teams. Amid her packed schedule, one passion remained close to her heart—softball. It was her one regret that Cedar Crest did not have a softball team during her time on campus. To remedy this, Cyndi generously funded the construction of a softball field in 1999, dubbed Cynthia Blaschak Field in her honor.

The Cedar Crest softball program has achieved remarkable success in recent years, including winning its first-ever Colonial States Athletic Conference (CSAC) Championship and making its NCAA Division III Tournament debut in 2021. This marked a turning point for the program, highlighting its steady growth since its inception.

Looking ahead, the softball field is undergoing a transformation, thanks in part to a \$1 million grant from the Redevelopment Assistance Capital Program (RACP) along with support from Lehigh Valley Health Network and other generous donors. The renovation will convert the grass field into an all-weather turf facility, complete with lighting and improved drainage. These upgrades will eliminate weather-related limitations, enhancing safety for the College's athletes and benefiting community groups that use the field. The field will be officially dedicated during Homecoming Weekend in October.

Through her visionary leadership and generosity, Cynthia Blaschak has left an indelible mark not only on Cedar Crest's softball program but on the College community as a whole. Beyond her role as an alumna, Cyndi has served the College in various capacities, including as a Special Programs Officer, Director of Admissions, and Executive Assistant to former President Blaney. She also held the position of Trustee from 1997 to 2009 and became the first alumna to chair the College's Board of Trustees from 2006 to 2009. Cyndi's contributions to the College have earned her numerous accolades, including the 1998 Associates of Cedar Crest Award, the 2006 Alumnae Association Award, and induction into the College's Athletics Hall of Fame in 2013.

Cyndi serves as a powerful reminder of how our alums can shape the future of Cedar Crest, ensuring that their values and legacy are passed on to future generations.







#### The Harmon Legacy and the Future of Technology at **Cedar Crest**



#### In a time of rapid technological change,

Cedar Crest College is stepping boldly into the future with the establishment of the Elaine and John Harmon Center for Leadership in Technology. This new initiative, made

possible by a generous gift from the estate of beloved alum Elaine Oberkotter Harmon '59 and her husband, John, will transform technology on campus. The Center will integrate technology across the College's curriculum and serve as a hub for educating leaders in the Lehigh Valley on the ethical and socially responsible use of technology to benefit communities.

The Harmons' gift also establishes the Harmon Professor of Leadership in Technology, who will develop new academic programs in fields such as Artificial Intelligence, Cybersecurity, and Digital Forensics. This marks a significant expansion of Cedar Crest's commitment to preparing students for the challenges of a rapidly changing world.

"The Harmons have deeply invested in Cedar Crest, building a legacy that empowers our students to lead in a technology-driven world," says Provost Robert Wilson. "Their gift will ensure our students are at the forefront of using emerging technologies to benefit our communities."

The Harmon Center will also offer ongoing education for leaders across the Lehigh Valley, addressing critical issues like the digital divide that affects marginalized communities.

"John and Elaine Harmon have left an indelible mark on our campus," says President Elizabeth Meade. "This transformational gift will establish Cedar Crest College as a leader in technology education."

#### ALUMS IN ACTION



Science has always held a special place in **KITTY KISH POCHMAN'S '73** heart. From the moment she stepped into Dr. Marion Kayhart's Biology 101 lecture, she knew she had found her calling. Over the next four years, Dr. Kayhart became her mentor, shaping not

just Kitty's academic journey but also her career path. Though her career trajectory didn't follow a traditional route, her experience at Cedar Crest and her passion for STEM led her to a career full of unexpected and exciting opportunities.

For more than 30 years, Kitty has been at the helm of nonprofit science organizations on Nantucket As the first Executive Director of the Maria Mitchell Association—a science center and historic house museum honoring America's first woman astronomer and women's rights advocate-Kitty spearheaded several multi-million-dollar campaigns to renovate facilities, build new ones, and endow staff positions during her 17-year tenure.

In 2007, Kitty became the first Executive Director of the Linda Loring Nature Foundation, a start-up that now protects over 275 acres of conservation land. Under her leadership, the property has blossomed into a sanctuary with walking trails through globally rare sandplain grasslands, a robust climate resiliency and rare plant species research program, and an environmental literacy initiative that helps foster a deeper connection to the natural world.

For the past eight years, Kitty has served on the national board of the Association of Nature Center Administrators, including a term as President. In every role, she has been a mentor to her staff and colleagues, always grateful to Dr. Kayhart and her Cedar Crest experience for inspiring her to advocate for women and lead by example.



MARCI MARTINEZ-HOWEY'S **'22** journey began at Cedar Crest in 1996, but life's twists and turns led her to take several breaks from her studies. The pandemic, though challenging in many ways, became an unexpected opportunity for Marci to refocus on her goals. "The pandemic gave me the time to make finishing school a priority," Marci explains. "It

wasn't so much that the pandemic impacted my learningit inspired me to come back." In 2021, Marci returned to Cedar Crest and completed her degree.

Today, Marci is the Associate Vice President of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion at United Way, where she's been making an impact for over eight years. Her role is deeply connected to her studies in Applied Psychology, helping her navigate the complexities of DEI work with a thoughtful, empathetic approach. "I've been doing DEI work all along, thinking about how to create inclusive environments," she says. "I've been able to apply my education directly to my daily work, from building relationships to ensuring our staff feels welcome, included, and respected."

For Marci, the most rewarding part of her job is the impact she has on her community. "Lifting up voices and being an ally to the community is incredibly fulfilling," she says. She remains committed to making a difference, both in her work and within the Cedar Crest Community.

Her advice to current students is simple: "Just keep going. When things get challenging, and you're contemplating whether to move forward, keep pushing through it. The reward is so much bigger than any challenges you'll face along the way."

Marci's journey is a testament to the resilience of Cedar Crest students, and her story serves as a reminder that it's never too late to finish what you started. Her success reflects the values of the College and illustrates the impact of both education and perseverance in shaping a meaningful, fulfilling career.



JENNIFER DAILY '03 has served as the Director of Counseling at Deerfield Academy in Deerfield Massachusetts, for the past two years. Graduating from Cedar Crest with a degree in Social Work, she has spent her career working across various sectors in the field. This June, Jennifer added another accomplishment to her resume—she became a published author with her book, The Magical Science of Feelings. Designed to help children understand the science behind emotions,

the book takes young readers on a lively tour of the brain to explore where anger, anxiety, sadness, and joy originate, and offers activities to help children manage difficult feelings.

Driven by constant curiosity, Jennifer is always ready to shake things up. Her guiding question, "Why this right now?" has been a cornerstone in her career, and she encourages others to find their driving guestion. "Once you discover that foundational guestion, navigating your career becomes so much easier," she says.

Her passion for helping others took root at a young age. At just eight years old, she knew she wanted to be a therapist for children and teenagers. Her interest was sparked when she learned that a family friend, whose parents were going through a divorce, felt better after spending time with an adult who simply let him play with Legos. In high school, she was further inspired to pursue a career in therapy by a school social worker who nurtured her growing passion.

Cedar Crest's social work program was the perfect fit for Jennifer. The program's emphasis on hands-on learning and the close-knit relationships between faculty and students provided her with leadership opportunities that helped shape her post-college career.

Some of Jennifer's most cherished memories at Cedar Crest revolve around the sense of community. She fondly recalls late nights on the steps of Butz with friends, singing and playing guitar, and learning new skills from classmates–like making balloon arches, a party trick she later passed down to younger students.

Reflecting on her time at Cedar Crest, Jennifer says, "No matter where life takes you, the Cedar Crest community will always be there for you."



For JANINE KISHBAUGH, B.S. 04', M.S. 09', staying connected with Cedar Crest is all about continuing the positive impact that her alma mater had on her on future generations of forensic scientists. "I could see the difference in the quality of my education from Cedar Crest after I transferred from another college my freshman year," says Kishbaugh. "I want Cedar Crest to be able to continue educating future generations and continue to positively impact the lives of our students."

Today, Kishbaugh is a professor in the Forensic Science Department, and plans the College's annual Forensic Science Symposium.

Every day is a reminder of how important this connection with her alma mater is to Kishbaugh. "Every time I walk across campus, I think about how lucky I am to work in such a beautiful place... You have to be a part of the CCC community to really understand how and why it is so special, but once you see it, it stays with you forever."


